The story of Vegemite

The story of Vegemite began with the Fred Walker Company in 1922. They wanted to create a spread with plenty of Vitamin B. The company hired a chemist called Dr Cyril P. Callister. It was he who developed the spread.

They wanted lots of people to buy their new product, so the company let the public name it themselves. They launched a national competition. In 1923, the product was named Vegemite. Soon, jars of Vegemite were being sold all over the country.

At the same time, there was a similar product from England known as 'Marmite'. Shoppers didn't want to try something different and Vegemite sales dropped. The company renamed it to 'Parwill' with a clever catchphrase to go with it: "If Marmite... then Parwill"! However, sales did not improve.

It took 14 years and a change back to its original name before the people of Australia embraced Vegemite. Doctors began recommending it and during the Second World War, the armed forces sent it to the soldiers. It became so popular that the company couldn't meet the demands of the public.

The company also created the song 'Happy Little Vegemites', which was released on the radio in 1954. It went onto the television in 1956. Even today, the song is easily recognised, with Vegemite putting 'a rose in every cheek'.

Did you know?

- Twenty-two million jars of Vegemite are sold every year.
- It has a thick and sticky consistency and is almost black in colour.
- Being one of the richest known sources of Vitamin B, it is very salty.

Australians are used to the flavour of Vegemite, as they grow up eating it. When travelling overseas, some people even take it with them as a small reminder of home. However, adults who try it for the first time say that it is something that takes a little getting used to!





Chance and probability - probability scale



Students create a table and list everyday events and their likelihood of occurring. Add the corresponding chance as a fraction, decimal and percentage.

Hard: Describe 5 events which each have a different degree of chance.

Trickier: Describe 5-10 events, which each have a different degree of chance.

Trickiest: Describe more than 10 events.

Example:

Event	Word to describe chance	Chance as fraction	Chance as decimal
I played a board game where I had to roll one dice. I needed to roll an even number to move my piece.	Even chance	3/6 (or ½ when simplified)	0.5


Art


A mandala is a complex abstract design that is usually circular in form.

Mandalas can contain both geometric and organic forms. They can also contain recognisable images that carry meaning for the person who is creating it.

FRIDAY

Music

Listen to an age appropriate song of your choice and write out the lyrics.

- Can you drum the beat of the song while it is playing?
- Can you write down all the instruments you can hear?
- Is there one main instrument you can hear?
- What do you think the message of the song is?
- How do you think is this song meant to make people feel?

Mathematics

Students create a bag of 10 items that have multiples but with different colours. The multiples don't have to be even. Some examples below:

- Different coloured socks (e.g. 5 red, 2 blue, 3 white etc)
- Coloured pencils/pens
- Coloured scrunched up paper
- As long as the total number of items is 10

Write the likelihood of pulling out each colour of the item (e.g. in the first example, there is a 5 in 10 or 1 in 2 chance of pulling out a red sock)

- 1. Pull an item out of the bag and record tallies on a table to show what item it was.
- 2. Return each item to the bag and repeat until you have had 10 attempts, recording as you go.

Reflection Questions:

- Which item did you pull out the most often?
- Did your results match the likelihood? Eg: did the number of items in that bag match the number of times you pulled it out?
- If not, why do you think this happened and what could you change about the experiment to make it more accurate?

(Hint: do the experiment another 10 times and see if you got more accurate results)

- Do you think your results would be more accurate if you do the experiment 100 times or if you do it 10 times? Explain your answer.
- Can you pose a mathematical question about your experiment (and can you answer it?)
